

NCGR Bull Session

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Del Tapparo, Windsor, CO

I converted a Bachmann Connie (2-8-0) to battery power R/C for Ken Jessen. Components: RailBoss 4 Plus, Battery Conversion Module, Phoenix Sound P8, 2.5" speaker with baffle, Tenergy 14.8V, 2600mah Li-Ion battery. Chuff triggered via factory contacts.

Physical location planning and test fit tender shell.




Battery Conversion Module on front of tender.

Loco ...

- Isolate track pickups. Remove brake linkage to access and remove plungers that contact drive wheels.
- Identify motor wires. Two center wires of 4 pin connector. Outer two are track pickups.
- Two wire connector is factory chuff contacts.

Tender ...

- Isolate track pickups. Remove brass strips and wires.
- Replace factor speaker with a better one.
- Determine location of components and test fit.
- Cut opening for sound card on top of speaker.
- 3D print mounting plate for Phoenix Sound card.
- Complete wiring and make sure tender shell will go back on.
- Program Phoenix Sound for C21 sounds.
- Test system on rollers.





The Pennsylvania Railroad wanted to create a freight version of its successful T1 duplex. The idea for a duplex is to divide the power between two sets of cylinders to reduce the pounding inherent with reciprocating power conversion to rotary power. Both set of drivers were on a ridged frame.

The Q1 was the Pennsylvania's first experiment with a duplex freight locomotive. After a prototype was rolled out it proved a disaster. This led to the Q2 with a 4-4-6-4 wheel arrangement. This became the largest non-articulated locomo-



tive ever built and at the same time, the most powerful locomotive ever static tested at almost 8,000 cylinder horsepower (about 6 kW).

They were the greatest successful duplex on the Pennsylvania. The propensity to have one set of driver slip was counter acted by an automatic slip control that reduced power to the slipping set of drivers. The railroad claimed the Q2 could pull 125 freight cars at a speed of 50 mph. It had only a slight advantage over the Pennsylvania's 2-10-4s, but with higher maintenance.

Betweer Unfortuna Between 1944 and 1945, 26 Q2s were built. As with all steam locomotives, by 1951 dieselization ended its service life. Unfortunately, all Q2s have been scrapped, and none were preserved.





In the middle 60's, I was a new art teacher in Boulder, Colorado who had a great passion for Colorado railroads, steam locomotives, and history generally. I had recently purchased a copy of Forest Crossen's book, *The Switzerland Trail of America*, and I called him to ask if he would sign my copy. He graciously agreed and invited me to his house on Spruce Street, west of 28th St. which at the time, was the eastern limits of Boulder development.

When I met him, he was firing up a large vertical boiler steam engine that was attached to a rather dangerous looking rotary sawmill. He asked if I wanted to join him for sawing some logs into firewood for heating his house in the upcoming winter. Of course, I said yes. The boiler included a large chime whistle which we would blow on numerous occasions during the woodcutting. The whistle was large enough that I'm sure it was heard all over Boulder. I'm certain that heating a home with firewood and blowing a steam locomotive whistle during the cutting would be strictly illegal now, and probably would've been illegal in Boulder in many recent decades.

Forest told me that the whistle was made by one of the Roundhouse workers at the old Colorado and Southern Roundhouse in Como during the early 1900's. The whistle was made on a special request by an early engineer named Walt Parlin.

He used it once at night when he was coming into Como from Gunnison with his special assigned engine. It was so loud that many towns people complained about the racket and the railroad superintendent told Parlin to take the whistle off immediately. Apparently, that was the only time that the whistle was blown in the town of Como. Forest Crossen was the first person to use the whistle again, this time in the backyard of his little frame house in Boulder ... and I was there, experiencing a different age.





My 41"x76" layout has 4 separate power supplies/ controllers, separate AC and DC HO loops, a "stub" 80" back and forth HO track, an HO switching yard, and more "stubs" for G, O and Z. I think that it's more engaging fun than playing a board game with four friends. The board has been removed from my study and it now resides in my sister's half of the Estes house. She doesn't seem to mind.

I've pulled up most of the G track on the deck around two sides of the front of the house. That will hopefully form two loops of track, together with track that I've scrounged from my nephew Logan's now defunct garden railroad layout, is going to provide the corpus of track for two simple loops around my front yard in McCall, Idaho. The plan will tentatively include both track and battery power. The track will be buried under approximately 6' of snow during the winter. Any thoughts from you folks?
