

Museum Happenings

These are the recent activities at the DGRS layout at the museum

The experiment for the DGRS out reach using the #7 Rose Garden loop and the existing Rail Boss radio control system seems to be well received by museum visitors.

Michele Miller has donated a Piko train set, Tyler Scott has also donated two new LGB cars to make a longer train.

This is a simple set up, the parents and children are outside of the fence by the Rose Garden loop with a DGRS member on the inside of the fence.

The DGRS member demonstrates to the parent how to use the RC controller.

Once the parent is comfortable running the train they can show the child how to use the system. For very small children the parent will hold the hand set and just the let child push the buttons.

It would be nice if the DGRS would put a sign inside of the loop mentioning that DGRS member Aleen Carruthers donated the track and plants to show that nice garden railway can be built in a small area. This could be like the sign like the garden railway gate.

I do have concerns about trying to manage this during the "Thomas" visit. We might find that long lines might form, sort of an unruly mob of angry parents and 6 year olds.

In June we will need operators on the 17th and 18th ,19th and 23rd for Colorado Power Days/Colorado Heritage week.

We will need help on the week before the swap meeting to price items and inventory them.

We will need help during the swap meet to set up tables bring the DGRS for sale items to the tent, someone to be the "bank", someone to oversee the garden railway and help buyers to test their locomotives and a bouncer?

How do you become a qualified DGRS operator?

You will need to take a tour around the garden railway with a qualified member to start, take a short test and then have several operating sessions with several different qualified members learn the ropes and procedures. If you already have experience operating a garden railway, it can make the orientation shorter. You will need to agree to work in the garden railway for 8 hours annually to help maintain the railway by doing maintenance work, such as cleaning rolling stock, weeding, cleaning track, painting, repairing buildings and help wherever it is needed. There is something to do for just about every ability. To get started please contact Don McCullough.

June Members meeting at Jareds Nursery

The monthly club meeting was held at Jared's nursery, where a presentation was made by Betsy Kelson on animal repellents and annuals one could use in your garden layouts.



coyote urine and blood meal, to discourage herbivores. Also mentioned was castor oil, which can cause diarrhea in animals that consume it, hopefully discouraging them coming to your table. Some sprays were also discussed whose use hopefully disgust unwanted guests.

The meeting began with the introduction of two "new" members, who were members years ago, Ronald Brackett and Chester Durnal.

Betsy started her presentation with granulized



Next mentioned was the max motion detector hose, which sends a spray to deter animals, especially deer. For those underground pests, Molemax mole and vole repellent, spikes which smell like rotten eggs that are inserted into the ground, was spoken of, to discourage the sandhogs from ruining our gardens.



Betsy then covered house plants that could be used as annuals in your layout, especially plants with thick trunks that can mimic trees. Herbs such as rosemary, thyme, lavender and basil can also be used. Hens & chicks can be used to mimic agave, and mosses can be used as ground cover. She also mentioned Lantana for a color splash on your layout. If drought is causing loss of some of your plants, the website Plantselect.org is an excellent site to find drought resistant plants. If you are looking for miniature shrubs for your garden railroad, the Isle nursery in a good resource you can use.

Finally, Michelle asked Betsy what to do if some of your plants of a species die, while others do not. Betsy suggested rooting a cutting of a survivor, rather than buying a new plant, as the genetics of the survivors may impart an advantage to surviving in this climate.

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
NCGR Summer Tours



Precision Machine Shop Locomotives


Cherylene came home from a DGRS board meeting with an idea that Doug Mayes had for a locomotive plaque for all of our members who opened their layouts during the 2022 convention. He thought they could be done on plastic, but Cherylene thought that metal would be better and that I could do them.



I took the idea to Warren Tech where I regularly volunteer. The Precision Machine Shop teacher, Joe Martin opened a file of patterns and I chose a locomotive from several that he had in that file. I liked the spoke wheels, the whistle, track with the ties, etc. Then we loaded it into the computer for the water jet machine. The green line in this photo shows the path the nozzle will take, starting at the lower left and exiting on the upper right.

NESTING

I had to nest as many locomotives as possible so that the waste would be minimized. I could only put 45 of the 50 required locomotives on one sheet. The rest had to be cut from another sheet. The data to the right of the nesting locomotives shows cost of the garnet, \$215 and the estimated time that the job should take, 4.8 hours to do the 45 cutouts if nothing goes wrong. Unfortunately, things went wrong.

The .032" steel sheet is submerged in about a half inch of water. The machine uses garnet (not sand) to cut the steel. The computer screen shows the progress the nozzle is making as it cuts the silhouettes.


After the check list was completed and all systems were ready, the water jet began laser cutting the steel. You can see the clamps that hold the steel in place.

Behind the aluminum doors in the background is a \$250,000 CNC (Computer Numerical Control) machine that Mr. Martin wrote a grant for the school.






In the photo on the left you can see where I have removed some of the locomotives to prevent the lazer from getting damaged. That yellow thing is a sponge and can get caught on a previously cut locomotives, flipping it up and damaging the nozzle. Since the lazer cuts at 47,500 lbs psi the sponge keeps water from spraying all over the room. In the photo on the right you can see some of the manual mill machines in the shop. This is just a very small portion of this facility. They have 5 or 6 CNC machines.





All 50 silhouettes are cut, but I forgot to program for the screw holes. Now they need to be drilled so they will be easy to mount on a fence, deck, wall, etc. Consequently, Cherylene and I drilled the holes in each locomotive and filed off the barbs.



That gold color is rust. I was amazed at how fast these things rusted. That gold color is rust.

This is the before and after pictures of them laid out in the sandblast machine. Each locomotive took about 10 minutes for me to sandblast both sides. That was more than 8 hours! Afterwards, The Collision Shop at Warren Tech powder coated them.







Doug Mayes has the silhouettes and after getting them lettered, they will be distributed to members who opened their layouts during the 2022 convention at a meeting (picnic? [Maybe I am a dreamer]) later this year.

I learned a lot about programing and running the water jet. I spent a week programing parts to be fabricated for a live steam Heisler locomotive I am building. Unfortunately, a student damaged the machine before I could make my Heisler pieces. Now I am doing them at home on my mill machine at a much slower pace. For example, the deck on the mainframe has 25 holes in it. The water jet could do that in 4 minutes. It took over 8 hours on my mill machine.

Jewel in the Desert

On one of my trips back to California a couple of years ago I found a jewel in the desert. I was traveling west bound on I-15. I was approaching a small town called Baker, California. It is located between Las Vegas, Nevada and Barstow, California. It lies in the bottom of a 30 something mile valley in literally the middle of nowhere. Baker survives only because of the traffic on I-15. It's claim to fame is a 3 story high thermometer that tells you how incredibly hot it is outside. As I crested the hill leading into Baker the traffic came to a complete stop. I was still 12 miles or so from Baker. I crawled along in the traffic for a couple of hours approaching Baker and decided to look across the valley with a pair of binoculars I carry in the car. Beyond Baker I could see the traffic was still bumper to bumper all the way up the other side of the valley, all the way over a small mountain range about 15 mile west of Baker. I decided I needed to plot a course out of this traffic mess if possible. I started to look on the map on my phone to see what the possibilities were. Baker has two exits west bound. The first exit just drops you into town.

The next exit still 2 or 3 miles away is the only other route out of town. My only chance was to get off on the first exit and try to get to the road out of town on the west side of town. That road runs north and south. North bound into Death Valley. South bound through the Mohave National Preserve. South bound leads to I-40 that would connect back to I-15 in Barstow. About a 50 mile detour. It was already triple digit temperature according to the 3 story thermometer. I didn't think heading into Death Valley was the best option. So I decided to head south bound through the Mohave National Preserve. It took me another 40 minutes or so to reach the only road in the area that would cross I-15 and headed south bound.

Its hard to describe the desolation and beauty of the Mohave National Preserve. It is hundreds of square miles of a desert landscape that is mostly void of vegetation or habitation other than the desert creatures that live there. It is some how beautiful in it's stark vastness. I headed south out of Baker towards I-40.. I was surprised that only a very few people were doing the same. Only a couple of other cars. So I was wondering if this was such a good idea or not. I'm glad I did.

As I was approaching I-40 about 40 minutes later I came upon one of the most beautiful train stations I have ever seen. At first I thought maybe the desert heat was getting to me. That this was a mirage. Out in the middle of this vast desert with nothing else around was the Kelso, California train station.



Kelso came into existence when the Union Pacific Railroad was trying to make it's way into southern California. They had already moved into northern California and was now trying to tap the markets in southern California. They made a deal with Senator William Clark of Utah to buy half the stock of the San Pedro, Los Angeles, Salt Lake Railroad before it was a complete railroad. They later bought the senator out completely. They had built the line through the Mohave desert to siding #16.



The story goes that the name came from 3 railroad workers who put their names in a hat and the name that was pulled from the hat was Kelso. So in 1905 siding #16 became Kelso station. The first station at Kelso was a small station for railroad workers, a water stop for the locomotives, and engine house for helper engines. Kelso slowly grew until the 1920's. When Union Pacific planned of putting a larger station to compete with the Santa Fe's Harvey House. They built the current Kelso Depot between 1923-24. During WWII Kelso boomed and population grew to around 2000. After WWII with a nearby mine closing also with advancement of diesel engines, Keslo became less important and declined until operations stopped in 1962. Although the eating house and crew guarter remained open, until Kelso was closed completely in 1985. The story doesn't end there. Union Pacific was planning to tear down the building because they didn't want the liability for unauthorized entrance and vandalism. A citizens group stopped the demolition of the building but could not raise enough money to restore the building. In 1994 the Mohave National Preserve was created and the depot was now owned by the National Park Service. Renovation began in 2002 and reopened with a new visitor center and parking lot in 2005. A few of the original buildings still remain. I will attach a link to their web site if you want to read a better The Kelso Depot is maintained by the National Park Service and is pristine history than I gave. condition. If you are ever traveling along I-40 please look for the Kelso Depot. It is very close to I-40. If you are traveling along I-15 through Baker east or west bound you can take the road to the Mohave National Preserve or Cima Rd. Exit east of town. I am glad I had to take this detour. It was well worth the side trip.

The World of 7 ½ Trains

Change in Plans

The best laid plans of mice and men . . . well, you know the old saying. Even with all the planning and best of intentions, the plans of the LCRR (*Larkspur Consolidated RailRoad*) to expand the railway and 'Conquer the Canyon' this summer have changed. As a reminder, the purpose of the expansion was to eliminate the amount of 'two-way' track along the main line in order to reduce the delays due to other trains already operating along the 'two-way' corridor. The major part of the project is building three bridges – one 8', one 17', and one 34'. The two shorter bridges are built and installed, but with the frequent and much-needed rain this Spring, we lost many work days. We also lost some work days due to illnesses and vacations. Due to the lost work days, our plans have changed. This article describes the three changes in plans, and the work accomplished in laying several hundred feet of track.

Changes

The delays experienced this Spring resulted in three changes to our plans.

First, the major change is the bridge over the canyon will not be installed this summer. While the bridge might be built later this Fall, it will not be installed before the LCRR hosts the August Meeting of DGRS.

Second, instead of installing the bridge, thanks to a suggestion by Dale Underwood, we will add a switch near the beginning of the 'two-way' track and lay about 40' of track that will connect with the several hundred feet of track described later in this article. Eventually, this 40' of track will become a

permanent siding on which we can park excess rolling stock. The photos below show the new switch being built (designed and constructed by Bob Leise) and then installed by Bob and Dale.

Third, the reversing spur planned before the bridge will not be built.





Laying More Track

Although some changes have occurred, one plan that has not changed is adding several hundred feet of

track on the other side (south) of the long bridge to reduce the amount of 'two-way' track. Bob, Pete, and Marilou Hendel spent several days laying that track. Below are photos of the ground being coarsely leveled.



After the roadbed was coarsely leveled, plastic was installed to retard plant growth and erosion, and then rail and ties were added.



After finishing the initial phase of adding the several hundred feet of track, the next step is to straighten, level, and ballast the track. That step has yet to be finished.

Conclusion

While we are disappointed the long bridge over the Canyon will not be installed before the August Meeting of the DGRS, our goal of eliminating the 'two-way' track will nearly be met. Adding the extra switch and several hundred feet of track will achieve 95% of that goal. We are excited to be able to host the DGRS August meeting again, and pleased with what we have accomplished.
