# LGB Remembers an American Narrow Gauge Shortline


LGB/Märklin takes us back to the memory of silver mine towns in Nevada with four items coming in third quarter 2024. Modeled on the 3-foot gauge Nevada Central Railroad in the 1930s just before it closed, the Mogul steam locomotive, passenger car, half baggage combine, and boxcar would have carried passengers, mail and freight between the Battle Mountain stop on the Central Pacific/Southern Pacific and the town of Austin, Nevada, near silver mines from the 1880s. Disney animator Ward Kimball purchased a Mogul from the NCRR when it shut down and renamed/repainted it "Emma Nevada" to run on his backyard Grizzly Flats Railroad. Emma Nevada is now on display in the Grizzly Flats barn at the Southern California Railway Museum in Perris, California.

LGB's Nevada Central Railroad (NCRR) Mogul 2-6-0 steam locomotive is equipped with an mfx/DCC decoder with multiple light and sound functions, a smoke unit with smoke exhaust synchronized to the wheels and cylinder steam, prototypical paint and lettering, driving wheels propelled by a ball-bearing Bühler motor, and traction tires.



20284 Nevada Central RR Mogul Steam Locomotive

The NCRR passenger car, half baggage car/combine, and freight boxcar are typical American old-timer cars painted and lettered for the Nevada Central Railroad as they were when used in the '30s. Cars come with metal wheelsets, complete interior details, and doors that can swing (or slide) open.

# Check Etsy Vendors for Detailing your Railroad

Etsy.com is generally regarded as a site to find hand crafted home decorations — wall plaques, cookie cutters, candles and the like. But we've been seeing some sites that make figures and kits of interest to garden railroaders. Here are a couple.

SWC3DBackshop specializes in 3D printing finely detailed kits of unusual railroading and logging equipment, as well as figures, in scales from "G" to "F" (1:20.3) to 7/8ths. Kits range from backwoods moonshine stills to 6-drum yarding donkeys. While the resin kits do not come with instructions, the owner, Mike, provides many pictures of the kits in various stages of assembly. Detail





parts such as Nut/Bolt/Washer castings and logging fairleads are also available.

Jim Sander's "Wee Bee Loco" has a reputation among the 'burnt fingers' crowd as a source for well-made live steam accessories such as gas fill adapters, Goodall valves and precision-tuned safety valves. The owner,

Jim Sanders, got out of direct sales several years ago, and his parts have become more difficult to find. However a shop has opened recently on Etsy called "MidwestRail" which focuses on distributing these specialty items. If you need a safety that pops off at precisely 60 lbs, this is the place to go. Midwest-Rail owner, Brian, has also started





making short flatcar kits with wood and 3D printing, a Hudson tipper wagon kit, and a variety of resin-printed figures in 1/32, 16mm, 1/20.3, and 7/8ths.


## A Look Back: Walter Robles' Silver Springs Railroad


By Carla Brand Breitner Started in 2003 and dismantled nine years later, the Silver Springs Railroad meandered through a 45' by 35' island in the center of Walter Robles' backyard. Starting with track, then trains, then buildings, Walter built a landscape with a foreground town and a background mountain. In between, miniature junipers and boxwoods grew near three waterfalls, a pond (then three), a few streams, eight bridges, and three tunnels. Two hundred+ feet of track with two mainlines and various sidings ran past a lumber mill, grist mill with working water wheel, horse ranches, and train stations. Little people appropriate to their location provided the finishing touch to a remarkable railroad. continued on next page

Walter, an accomplished motion picture stunt man, had a great eye for visual detail. His western narrow gauge railroad was set in the late 1800s. Two years into building his railroad, he wrote, "My interest in trains started when I thought it would be nice to have a train running around my Christmas tree. That led to a track going around my yard. That led to buying lots of trains. That led to lots of buildings. But something was missing. It needed a pond... and maybe a couple of streams. With three waterfalls and eight bridges, I now had three ponds with fish, three tunnels 15, 7 and 3 feet long, and over 200 feet of track. That should do the trick!

"But it still needed something else: trees, little people, sounds coming from the houses, music, laughter, crickets—maybe a mountain. I've been at it for two years and still not finished."

Walter continued improving the Silver Springs RR, detailing the town, building up the mountain, bringing electricity to light up the buildings with Edison's new light bulbs, and setting up farms and ranches. His eye for staging his little people made each scene look natural, not forced. At a glance, you could tell why the animal or person was there and what they would do next as they went about their day.

Silver Springs RR in Reseda was dismantled when Walter moved to take a producing job. Hope you enjoy this look back.





#### WHAT'S A BLUNAMI SHAY?

Twenty years ago, we converted a large scale Bachmann 2-truck Shay to a radio control, battery powered, sound specific system. The radio control was manufactured by Remote Control Systems (RCS) of Australia and consisted of a receiver, a distribution board and a handheld transmitter. Batteries were Ni-Cd and the sound system was a separate Soundtraxx, Shay only, sound card. The limited space in the Shay required components to be installed in the tender, inside and under the cab.

The wiring (with tender at 90°) looked like this:



Recently, Soundtraxx released a Blunami sound decoder, BLU-4408, that can handle large scale trains, and I thought this would be a good opportunity to upgrade my Shay. I wasn't disappointed! The Blunami unit has both the receiver and sound built in. It can be powered by battery, DCC or DC, but still requires a speaker for sound. At a retail price of \$205, this sound decoder is not inexpensive. However, considering the cost of the old system twenty years ago for a transmitter, receiver, distribution board(s), RF filters and sound card, the BLU-4408 is a lot less expensive in terms of dollars and installation headaches.

The BLU-4408 is controlled by a free App downloaded from Soundtraxx and can be run from an Apple or Android smartphone, tablet or iPad with Bluetooth capability. Yes, I wrote Bluetooth! Controlling the BLU-4408 is done via Bluetooth and means compatibility and upgrades are available across all systems. In addition, instead of just a fixed locomotive sound, there are dozens of whistles, chuffs, bells, and other sounds that are EASILY selected through the App. No dealing with DCC CV values. Simply touch and select options from the onscreen menus.

Installation starts with removing the one screw under the water fill cap and then labelling all the wires. A very important step! Taking a few photos of the wiring layout before cutting is also my recommendation. The BLU-4408 board is clearly marked and, unlike some other boards, reversing the polarity hookup will not burn out the board. Almost fool proof, but I digress.

I hooked up the new BLU-4408 board to the existing Soundtraxx speaker of twenty years ago and promptly blew out the amplification circuit on the board. Soundtraxx, under warranty, repaired it. IMPORTANT: since the BLU-4408 amplifier circuit is rated at 3 Watts, you MUST use a speaker of 3 watts or greater. My old speaker was rated at 2 watts and was the cause of the failure.

I needed to call Soundtraxx to clarify some points and specialist George was most helpful. There is a hookup called "Function Common" where any positive accessory wires from lights (cab-rear-head) or glowing firebox must go into. I use LEDs in my lights and had to be certain to connect negative wires to board labels and positive lighting wire to the Common Function for the LEDs to light. The board is clearly labelled for ALL these hookups so there is no guesswork once you understand the function of each hookup. Speaking of hookups, all terminals on the board are screw down type so there is no soldering needed. A real plus from the "old days." The original Bachmann chuff activation wires were no longer needed as the BLU-4408 has the capability of adjusting the chuff through Back EMF (based on velocity).

I'll quickly mention the batteries I used. The space in the Shay tender is tight and I used two 7.2V 1600 mAh NiMH batteries in series to fit the back of the Shay tender and get my required 14.4 V. These are perfectly shaped for installation in the Shay, and I purchased mine (part# CU-JAS131) from BatterySpace.com



Here is what the BLU-4408 installation looked like:



After completing the installation, I bench tested all functions. Then came the scary part for me. Putting it all back together and perhaps finding a wire connection came loose or something I hadn't planned on occurring. Fortunately, when taking the locomotive out to the layout, it ran flawlessly and with a transmitter range I haven't seen in years. Given the quality and functionality of the BLU-4408, I would recommend it to anyone looking for a premium sound decoder that can be powered by track or battery, with an outstanding App and all controlled via Bluetooth.

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# Building a Milwaukee Road Terminal Caboose

My indoor layout is based on the Milwaukee Road's Beer Line branch. One of the unique pieces of rolling stock populating the line was the Terminal (Milwaukee's nomenclature for "Transfer") Caboose. The rail-road's shop built 46 of them on the frames of abandoned locomotive tenders in 1956–57. I had renderings of the caboose enlarged from drawings I had seen.

I thought I would attempt to scratch-build a model. At that time, my plan renderings seemed to be in large scale, but not sure which. I did some online research and discovered they were published in the railroad's historical society's booklet called *Milwaukee Road's Steel Cabooses* by Jeff Kehoe. I knew I had the book, and after searching the house for a week, I found it. There it was in amongst unopened boxes of videos, magazines and books stored in our garage since we moved to a new home eight years ago.

I had done a prescient job a decade before. I had enlarged the renderings of both sides and the roof to 1/29th scale with measurements confirmed by the book that provided all the relevant dimensions. That opened the door to looking to USA Trains (charlesro.com) and Bachmann (bachmanntrains.com) for suitable parts.

That's the background; I'll let pictures and captions tell the rest of the story.

The body's base is styrene with U channels on both sides. Most of the underframe is from USA Train's (USAT) Bay Window Caboose. The casting includes the steps and truck bolsters; however, there is no brake rigging provided on that model. Because the AB brake system is highly visible in the center, the brake parts came from USAT's flat-car underframe. The Bettendorf trucks are USAT and the metal wheels are Bachmann's. The castings from USAT are not compatible with my plastic cements requiring the use of Walther's Goo, and, like most of the rest of the model, screws are used to ensure a solid model.



Here is a close-up of the painted and weathered underframe. In the previous picture you'll notice I chose Kadee 831 truck-mounted couplers with a large offset. I did this not wanting to mount a coupler box directly to the see-through tread between the stairs. The tradeoff is that USAT trucks have a low mounting bar to suit their proprietary couplers.



The cabin assembly is made of styrene. Because of the cutting required for doors and windows, the walls are laminates of thin sheets. The small black piece, upper right of the door is made of Plastruct square rod and drilled from above to create a snap-in holder for the ladder.



This is a railing test. The body was taped to the platform. Holes were drilled in the end stantions (Plastruct square rod) and the brackets on the body. Minor revisions were needed.



Here is the painted body. One departure from prototype is the small hinges in the upper corners. There was a time when I needed two small doll-house hinges for another project, but the minimum order was 100. So, from my plentiful inventory, I decided to create fold-out red markers signaling the rear.



The finished model with light weathering and decals applied. The roof has a smoke stack (USAT), a small vent, roof walks (USAT) and distinctive roof railings. There's one problem. The truck-mounted couplers are hidden because of the length of the porches.


So, a bridge between the couplers and the bar from the truck had to be created. Here (in white) it is being tested to a Kadee height gauge. Prototype photos show the bar from the underframe is heavy-duty steel and muscular.



The solution (above) looks anemic. To create a more muscular looking coupler extension, more styrene was used to clad the original.



The final result with extended couplers. The end castings, with brake wheels, are what USAT calls "Bay window caboose ladder assembly." I moved the ladders to the caboose body. Here's the caboose crossing Humboldt Avenue on my layout.





All the detail of the original drawings, and seen in the photo in the background, appear in the model, including the white railings. Now it's time to roll.



# Succulents are a Great Choice for Garden Railroads Part 2 By Marilyn Teague

Welcome back. Last issue we talked about the benefits of adding succulents to your garden railroad. Hopefully you were intrigued and maybe even picked out a place in your layout for some *aeoniums* or a bonsai crassula. Now it's time to pass along some tips to help you make those plans a reality.

#### Layout Design

If you don't already have a layout, this is the perfect time to plan your garden railroad with succulents in mind. Incorporate elevated areas, gentle slopes, and rocky terrains where succulents can thrive. If you have an existing layout, look for areas that need refreshing or where you'd like another point of interest. Once you know where the new plants will go, take a moment to decide how you'll bring water to the succulents, especially if they'll require a different watering schedule than the existing plants.

#### **Plant Selection**

Research different succulent varieties and choose those that complement the theme of your garden railroad. Last month's article included some examples to get you started, but there is a tremendous variety of succulent species available in the San Diego area. Wander the aisles of your local nursery to get more ideas. I've found some great options at Walter Anderson Nursery in Poway and our local Home Depot. Check the plant tags before you buy to make sure your new succulent is compatible with the light conditions in your layout.

Potting mix and pumice

#### Soil

Succulents need well-draining soil to avoid root rot. Overwatering is the most common problem that new growers encounter. If your current soil doesn't drain well, consider mixing succulent potting mix with the existing soil where you're planting. I've found that amending the top 6-8 inches of soil around a new plant helps it drain well and root successfully. There are many brands of succulent soil available locally and on-line. E.B. Stone Cactus and Succulent Mix is one of my favorites, it has a nice balance of organic and coarse material. I often add pumice (available at your local nursery) to the potting mix (1 part pumice to 3 parts potting mix) to improve drainage even more.

#### Watering

Even though succulents are drought tolerant, routine watering is still required, especially in the summer. The key is to avoid overwatering your succulents. Remember to let the soil dry out between waterings. Using a low-flow drip irrigation system with a timer can provide the right amount of water directly to the roots. These systems offer multiple dripper and sprayer options and are easy to set up and modify as your succulent collection grows. Be wary of adding the optional soaker hoses to your drip system. We found that the soaker hoses attracted thirsty canyon critters from the other side of our fence. Field mice, etc. would regularly chew through the hoses. Swapping the soaker hoses for dripper and sprayer heads fixed the problem.

#### Fertilizing

#### Drip watering system components

Outdoor succulents generally don't require additional feeding if they're planted in healthy soil. But if the soil is lacking nutrients, there's little downside to occasional fertilizing. It's best to use a product formulated specifically for succulents or cacti to avoid burning the plant (succulents are sensitive to high nitrogen content fertilizers). Just follow the directions on the package. I've tried fertilizing our succulents off and on over the years with mostly positive results.





#### Maintenance and Tools

Once your plants are in place and growing happily, you'll need to trim them back occasionally to maintain the scale of your layout. I use basic garden pruners for much of this work, but have found that our cordless Ryobi hand-held grass trimmer works wonders to keep our ground cover away from the tracks.

You might also find a random weed or two hiding among your succulents. A Japanese Hori-Hori knife can make weeding almost effortless. It's a great all-around tool that's good for digging, planting, and even cutting small branches. Once you have one, you'll find all kinds of uses for it. Finally, a pair of long-sleeved gardening gloves comes in handy when you work around succulents with sharp spines or corrosive sap.

These are just a few tips to get you started. So much more can be learned by simply giving succulents a try. Our San Diego climate (coastal prairie and sage scrub) is ideal for incorporating these plants in your garden railroad. 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

# **My Eggliner Pickup**

by David Hawk, member of the Buckeye State Garden Railroaders



My wife and I love the Eggliners first made by Aristo-Craft and now Bachmann. I wanted to have something different. I thought, "Pickup Truck" since I drive a truck. So I looked for and found a used Eggliner on line, a Maintenance of Way (MOW) by Aristo-Craft. I got it for a good price and started planning.

First I removed the four screws on the bottom beside the motor block. This loosened the body from the frame. Then I looked at separating the front and back halves. This proved simple since the Aristo-Craft Eggliners were only glued together. Bachmann Eggliners are molded as one piece so you would have to cut it apart. After separating, I cut the wire for the 3 lights on the half I planned on cutting down to make the truck bed. Then, it was to the bandsaw to cut off the windows. I cut at the bottom of the window which left a rib on it to glue the base. A red paint pen covered the cut and that was done.

The Eggliner had a cardboard base in it, so I took a piece of 1/8" clear plastic and traced it out. Then I roughed up one side so paint would stick and painted it black. I put the painted side down in the bed of the pickup, so the paint would not scratch when items were loaded. I also traced the outside of the cab and cut plastic to make the back of the cab. I painted that grey to match the cab.

I work in a machine shop where we buy small end mills to drill material. I took a couple of the clear round plastic tubes they come in, and cut the ends off to make the yellow dome on top and red on the rear. Then, I used black plastic we had and made the .400" diameter by 1/8" thick base for the dome. I measured the dome part to make it fit the base; all are different diameters. I drilled 3/16" diameter holes in the body to allow the wire to go through, but not the LED (LEDs from Evan Design) and yes, they blink! Then, using the wire ends from the lights I cut off the Eggliner, I connected each LED to one of the wires.



You can put barrels, cable or a toolbox on the bed of the truck (held on with removable putty or gel), so it can go out and repair that track!

## Hillendale Rwy #10 Styled as a late 1890s Baldwin 4-6-0 by Michael Lechicky

Hillendale Railway #10 is a Bachmann Annie 4-6-0 that I painted and detailed in an attempt to represent Baldwin Locomotive Works products of the late 1890's. My locomotive was finished for my fictional railroad, the Hillendale Railway, as a sorely needed new passenger locomotive. It enjoys a healthy working life pulling passenger trains in my backyard in New Jersey.




Back in the 1800's, American railroads did not have paint schemes: rather, locomotive builders had paint schemes, so a Rogers locomotive on a given road would look a certain way, while a Baldwin would have its own distinct livery. In the mid-1800's, locomotive liveries were quite colorful, sometimes zany, while by the 1920's most railroads were specifying black paint on new orders. But the period between 1890 and 1910 is one that I feel is not covered by many modelers, and I find myself drawn to these Edwardian locomotives. For Baldwin at that time. a deep olive green was the basic ground color, and the linework and gilt had become greatly subdued since the 1870's but was still mildly ornate. In the 1890's, a Baltimore & Ohio locomotive painted for the 1893 Columbian Exposition inspired a resurgence to somewhat more ornate tastes, and this is how my locomotive is painted.

I referred to the *Baldwin Book of Styles* digitized by Stanford University in 2022 [https://searchworks.stanford. edu/view/4082933], a master book housed at Baldwin that directed painters in the finish and linework of steam locomotives. The two-volume book contains gorgeous hand-painted renderings of domes, headlights, cabs and other details that the painters would reference and mix and match (as directed) to cobble together the paint scheme for a new locomotive. I was also inspired by Detroit & Lima Northern #7, an 1897 4-4-0 at The Henry Ford museum.


Much of the gold linework was applied by hand with the tip of a paperclip; I found a pigment-rich gold acrylic ink that gave a much more robust luster than conventional gold paint or paint pens. In fact, the entire locomotive was hand-painted. (Badger Modelflex paint brushes on really well.) The tender, on the other hand, utilizes a printed wrapper laminated with gloss packing tape. The dome artwork is printed wrappers, with screen captures from the digitized Baldwin book itself of the appropriate geometric arabesques. It should be noted that by 1898, the chosen build year for my model, Baldwin was no longer in the habit of providing its products with either brass boiler bands or ringed ("fluted") domes. However, I've found Baldwin builder's photos as late as 1903 with these features, so I figure it was a special order by my fictional railway company.

The boiler jacket is much too flashy to be "accurate," but it has the benefit of looking neutral-colored under cloudy skies, and brilliant blue on a sunny day. This is because I used holographic vinyl for the jacket. It mimics in practice, if not in science, the general effect of the prototype. Back when paint wasn't heat-resistant, locomotive boilers were clad in a bare-metal reflective jacket that was both rust-proof and heat-resistant, called, broadly, planished iron.

Why does it have a wood-burning stack but a coal-burning smokebox? Dunno, I liked the visual combination.

I found that picking out individual details with paint greatly enhanced the already great detail on the Bachmann model. For instance, I painted the oil cups on the driving rods a brass color, and carefully masked the cylinders and cab to give sky-facing surfaces an oxide red finish. Baldwin painted roofs and walking surfaces with a durable, easily-repaintable oxide paint; these parts of the locomotive would not be seen by the public from the ground.

Small details can go a long way.

### A Look Forward: Matt Abreu's Hidden Jewel, A Railroad in a Garden By Jeff Namba

Tucked away in a quiet portion of Granite Bay (near Sacramento) is a gem of a layout that's designed to complement the beauty of its surroundings, rather than command all of your attention.

Upon first arriving in the backyard of Matt Abreu's home, one gazes across the grassy yard and sees several vintage steam tractors and wonderfully rusted out Ford pickups permanently parked in the neatly manicured garden landscaping along the far perimeter of the property. The bed of one old truck is the source of a waterfall that cascades down into a small pond below. A walking path from there leads to a comfortable viewing area with a fire pit, and nearby is a small rustic shed that has an old Coke machine on its porch. A well-worn mining cart perches near the end of a small section of track. There's a converted silo that houses a barbecue and other kitchen amenities for entertaining. With all of these eye-catching elements to study,



you'd be forgiven for not immediately noticing the evidence of a garden railroad, and that's by design. Granted the eighteen foot long, two and a half foot tall wooden trestle at the far end of the property tells you that there's a model train layout here, but at first blush you'll still need to look a little harder for clues.

Marvelous Matt's Mining Company is a labor of love conceived by Matt Abreu of the Sacramento Valley Garden Railway Society (SVGRS). Built in 2020 in the expansive backyard of his home, this isn't so much a garden railway as a "railway in the garden." You won't find miniature towns or railyards, no gatherings of tiny people and livestock—just trains.

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




Matt's reasoning for this is that when there aren't trains running, the surrounding garden landscaping comes back to the forefront.

When the trains *are* running, it is impressive. They make their way around 800 feet of track, including the aforementioned trestle, under large evergreens and past neatly manicured flowers and plants in a twisted over/under figure 8 configuration. In order to accommodate some of the larger locomotives in the Abreu collection, the sweeping curves have at least a 16' diameter. Piko 10' flex track is used throughout to keep the number of rail joints to a minimum. When idle, the trains are hidden from view; they are parked in a 32-foot long indoor storage yard behind that rustic shed, with five long lines of storage.

The train inventory includes a large array of steam and diesel locomotives, all battery powered with AirWire controllers and Phoenix sound. And there's a dizzying collection of rolling stock. On any given day of train operation you'll see long consists comprised of loaded flatcars, coal cars, lumber, MOWs, you name it. Everything has been weathered and/or customized in some fashion, typically with graphics Matt has come up with himself.

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Last September, the Sacramento Valley GRS general meeting took place here and a train promoting the 2025 National Garden Railway Convention was on full display. Each locomotive and car in the train had a unique graphics wrap painstakingly applied depicting scenes and landmarks in the greater Sacramento area. As the Chairman of the upcoming 2025 National Garden Railway Convention, Matt is doing more than his part to help promote not only this upcoming event but the hobby of model railroading as a whole.

Matt's enthusiasm extends well beyond his home layout. He is also part of the SVGRS Modular Group that travels to various events in the region with a portable layout to help spread the G-Scale gospel. And for the last several years he and his dad Jerry have shown off their rolling diorama The Wandering Railroad—a converted horse trailer that houses a beautifully detailed and highly animated scenic layout that can be set up in just minutes. The two Abreus have travelled far and wide, including the NGRCs in Denver and Santa Clara, proving what can be done with large scale trains in a compact space with enough ingenuity and know-how.

So make a mental bookmark to attend the next NGRC event in Sacramento in 2025 where Matt's "railroad in a garden" will emerge in its full glory. It should be one of the high-lights of the Open House tours!

If there is interest, then we will do some "operating" so you can try your hand at doing some switching and doing a switching puzzle.


Finally, we will have a trunk sale for any of your surplus Gauge One trains. Bring anything you want to sell and we will have a place where you can display your items for sale.
